
### Appendix A: Methodology

This is the sixth edition of Asthma UK's Annual Asthma Survey report. Every year we ask the same questions on basic care, asthma control and emergency admissions. This allows us to track trends and spot reoccurring themes that need to be addressed. As well as providing an update for these questions, this year's report has shown us new insight into reasons for not attending an annual review, emergency care follow-up and asthma attacks. We have proposed solutions to issues raised by the results of the survey including health advice for people with asthma and potential policy changes to tackle existing inequality in asthma care.

The survey was conducted online and ran from mid June to late August 2018. The survey was promoted through our email newsletter, social media channels and website.

#### **Survey respondents**


The survey received 10,161 responses, and after data cleaning 10,064 respondents were included in the analysis¹. Of these responses, 8361 were from England, 526 from Wales, 916 from Scotland and 261 from Northern Ireland (figure 1). The age group with the largest number of respondents was 50-59 (2407), equivalent to 24% of total respondents. We received a similar number to last year's survey for under 17s (886) and these figures include those who completed the survey on behalf of their children.



<sup>1</sup> The data cleaning included removing duplicates. Duplicates were indicated by IP address and similar demographic question answers.

Women made up over three quarters (78%, 7824 of 10064) of the survey respondents (figure 2). This is similar to the previous survey results, with women providing 75% of total responses in 2017. The gender balance in asthma prevalence is 56% women and 44% men. This means that 2.4 million men have asthma in the UK, so once again encouraging more men to take part in next year's survey will be a priority.
